






Initial trial

Results:

- 70% reduction in time taken to check traps each day!!
- 200% reduction in number of staff
- Vehicle use reduced from three to one and kilometres travelled daily declined by 43%



 Uptake of tech easy for most, difficult for some


 Word of mouth – created own momentum for program
